

### **Scout Master Minute**

### Keep your pace to Eagle

For those of you who went to Tamalpais, the hike was like your Trail to Eagle. For those of you who were at the ITLS campout, the flow of the campout was like your Trail to Eagle. In fact, most of you at most events, the events are like your Trail to Eagle, especially when you are getting up in morning preparing to pack up and making breakfast.

At most events we rally at the Masonic Center. We may take some extra time then to get organized, thinking, or rather not thinking, that we have plenty of time. We may then go to the container and take some extra time to decide what gear to collect because the scout in charge did not come prepared with a check list and even though we have been on many campouts, we still need to remember and rethink what to bring. When we arrive at the venue we may take some more time to get organized again and fool around a little more. While on the event you may take breaks and fool around and have to make up for not being prepared. All of these delays are things we could have controlled or managed.

After that there may be the unexpected, a trail closure, a flat tire, an injury, etc. We are supposed to be prepared for anything but even being prepared for the unexpected delays the process.

Your Trail to Eagle starts at the Scout Rank. You may start to work on your Tenderfoot, complete a requirement, but then forget to get it signed off in your scout book. You may want to get more skills signed off at a campout but then forget to bring a lightweight stove or some rope. You may start a merit badge and get a partial and then let it be, "almost done," for several years. There may be a sport you take up or a school play or some other distraction of youth that takes you away from Scouting for a season. Then you find yourself at age 17 with several merit badges to go, possibly some leadership requirements, and your Eagle Project left with the clock ticking. You are also facing unexpectedly difficult AP classes and trying to apply to colleges.

The better way is to work backwards from your goal. Work backwards from your 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. As a senior you will be very busy. Perhaps it would be wise to finish your Eagle Rank the summer between your Junior and Senior year. So, you would need to be Life between the end of your Freshman year or start of your Sophomore year. Working backwards still, Star by the end of 8<sup>th</sup> grade is a good goal, and First Class sometime in 7<sup>th</sup> grade keeps you on schedule. The same can be said of Eagle required merit badges. Until they are all done, every scout should be actively working on at least one Eagle required merit badge.

Have you passed these life trail markers? That only means you will need to play catch up. Keep on schedule and you can enjoy scouting and learn and have fun on a steady and fulfilling trail.












If you had a magic wand, would you use it to make the Scouting program better and more fun for son and his scout buddies so they stayed in Scouting longer, so it had a larger impact on their lives? What if the same magic wand made leadership roles easier and more rewarding, and also led to better retention among adult volunteers? Would using that magic wand be a top priority?

Although the Florida Sea Base has a vast program facility (the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico), it has a limited land base. Therefore, housing for ALL participants will be in the SCUBA dorms. The dorms consist of separate male and female bunk-style beds with common bathroom/shower facilities. The forms are quite comfortable, but they were built with the occasional summer or fall tropical storm in mind which means they are on the second story and do not have elevator access.
